



SO SOLID CREW

ARCHITECTS ACROSS THE PLANET ARE MAKING USE OF THE NATURAL TERRAIN, AND CREATING INSTANT STONE-COLD CLASSICS

Top row, from left: in Canyon Point, Utah,
Amangiri is constructed around a 164-millionyear-old rock, which appears to tumble into
the main pool. Down in southern Chile,
Explora Patagonia overlooks Lake Pehoé and
the Torres del Paine National Park. Far
to the north, in Chile's terracotta-coloured
Catarpe Valley, Alto Atacama Desert Lodge
integrates into the mountainside. Vaulted
white-washed Apulian stone covers the pool
at Relais La Sommità in the town of Ostuni in
Puglia, southern Italy. At 1,200 feet above
the Pacific, the Post Ranch Inn, in Big Sur,
California, is built into the ridge.

Middle row, from left: in Taormina, Sicily,
Unahotels Capotaormina has a beach that
spills out from a cave on the Bay of Naxos. The
Kagga Kamma Nature Reserve's rooms have
been built into the sandstone of South Africa's
Cederberg mountains. Architects Snøhetta
recreated ancient cave dwellings using 3D
laser scanning at the Lascaux IV International
Centre for Cave Art in France. Back in South
Africa, eco walks on the Kagga Kamma Nature
Reserve visit vast formations, home to
6,000-year-old rock paintings. In Cappadocia,
Turkey, the Yunak Evleri hotel complex
includes a series of ancient cave houses with
furniture dating back to the Ottoman Empire.

Bottom row, from left: the pool at Belmond Reid's Palace is cut into a cliff on Madeira, Portugal. A former military fort, Cap Rocat in Mallorca has lookout points converted into rooms with private plunge pools. Seafood favourite Grotta Palazzese emerges from the rockface at Polignano al Mare in Puglia. Back in Mallorca, labyrinthine paths create a Moorish-citadel vibe at Cap Rocat. The Gamirasu Cave Hotel, in Turkey's historic Ayvali Village, was a monastic retreat during the Byzantine era. KATHARINE SOHN
